NEWS IN BRIEF

12TH DECEMBER

1724 The birth of Admiral Samuel Hood, first Viscount, British naval commander and a skilful tactician. 1966 English sailor Francis Chichester arrived at Sydney in his ketch Gipsy Moth IV half way in his bid to become the first man to sail solo around the world.

13TH DECEMBER

1769 - Dartmouth College is founded by the Reverend Eleazar Wheelock, with a royal charter from King George III, on land donated by Royal Governor John Wentworth

14TH DECEMBER 1947 Stanley Baldwin, three times Conservative Prime Minister, died. 1959 The shortest murder trial in British legal history. In 30 seconds, at Winchester Assizes, Brian Cawley pleaded guilty to the murder of Rupert Steed and was later sentenced to life

15TH DECEMBER 1961 In Jerusalem, Adolph Eichmann, one of the major organisers of the Holocaust, was sentenced to death.

1982 Reputed to be Robin Hood's tree, the 'Major Oak' in Sherwood Forest, was fitted with a fire alarm.

16TH DECEMBER 1653 Following the execution of Charles I, Oliver Cromwell failed to get the Parliament he wanted and became Lord Protector. 1882 Sir Jack Hobbs. renowned cricketer and the first of his sport to be knighted, was born.

Heat pumps, an owner's view...

At this time of fears of global warming and high energy prices, I am often asked for my experience of converting to an air source heat pump (ASAP) for home heating.

I had an air source heat pump installed in my 200-year-old stone and cob three-bedroom cottage two years ago. Generally I am very satisfied with my new heating system. It provides near constant warmth. It is virtually silent and is reasonably inexpensive to run.

It has a sophisticated timer/ control program; however, I turn it on first thing in the morning by setting my thermostat at 20°C and then down to 17°C at night. The capital cost of my system was £13,000, of which the government is repaying me £8,000 over seven years

My installers replaced most of my radiators with double capacity ones, which are needed due to the lower running (40°C) temperature of the system. Efficiency of ASAP is that for every kilowatt of electricity input you get just over 4 kilowatts of heat output which, I consider, is real efficiency.

Before last April my electricity bill (100% renewable) was £80 per month over the year. It is now energy price rises.

For those people considering an ASAP, it is helpful and important to follow these guidelines:

a) start with getting an Energy Performance Certificate, this will indicate where you need to improve the insulation of your property. Insulation is a must in running any heating system efficiently and it will pay back its initial costs quickly;

b) enquire about the various government and local authority schemes that are available for home insulation and renewable energy heating grants;

currently £130 per month due to c) research as to who are reputable and experienced heat pump installers and if possible ask for reports from customers who have had a system installed;

> d) make sure that you choose a high-quality ASAP system from a quality maker with years of experience. My ASAP is a Mitsubishi, a company with an excellent reputation that has been making heat pumps in Scotland for many years.

> Installing a heat pump system has proved itself a rewarding decision and has resulted in a warm home that is affordable to run as well as less damaging to the environment than traditional systems.



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
